ou swim up to the WorldMark Denarau Island bar in the largest pool in the South Pacific, order an orange juice and lie back to let your jet lag float away. You're in verdant, tropical Fiji, watching tufted white clouds under deep blue skies on the main island of Viti Levu. Kids laugh in the children's pool. You smell meat grilling in the resort's central barbecue area. Tonight, you'll attend a pit-oven lovo feast and classical meke dance, or maybe just cook something simple from the resort store, listen to a little music and drift off to sleep in airconditioned comfort.

With WorldMark's private balconies and direct beach access, the Denarau Golf and Racquet Club next door and a wealth of entertainment within walking distance, you might be content never straying from Denarau. But perhaps the local marina will tempt you out for a desert isle excursion or a cruise to colorful coral reefs to snorkel amid strange and brilliant fish. Luscious fruits, fragrant Indian spices, ancient crafts and bustling restaurants might draw you to the shops and outdoor market in nearby Nadi (pronounced Nan-dee) The open-faced kindness, simple happiness and curiosity of the Englishspeaking locals could stimulate the same qualities in yourself, drawing you into the land and its people. You'll learn to say "bula" for "hello" and "vinaka" for "thank you," and will be warmed by the smiles returned. Maybe you'll ask the resort tour desk to help you visit a traditional village in the steep, green mountains. Or you'll put on a flower print sulu, mingle with locals on the bus, or join a song-filled kava ceremony or church service. Fiji will find you. Sooner or later, you're bound to go native.

GETTING INTO THE ISLANDS

Fiji is a newly independent nation of about 300 islands and 540 islets some 1,300 miles north of New Zealand. About 100 islands are inhabited, the

rest being left as alluringly pristine nature reserves.

Seafaring Polynesians settled Fiji about 3,500 years ago, and Melanesians pushed into the area 2,000 years later. British explorer James Cook found warlike cannibals here in the late 1700s. But a century later, capitalism had replaced cannibalism as the British assumed control and missionaries converted the population to Christianity. The colonial government imported indentured laborers from India to maintain the village system and protect native Fijians from exploitation. Today, Indian Fijians make up nearly half the country's population of 800,000 and generally run the shops and cut the sugar cane, while the ethnic Fijians own most of the land. This has made for some difficult politics since independence was granted in 1970. But at street level, courtesy and respect characterize relations between the peoples. And for visitors, the mosques and Hindu temples of Indian Fijian settlements give interest to the landscape much like the indigenous Fijian thatched bure buildings do, while Indian curries, breads and soups add variety to rich, meaty and mellow Fijian home cooking and continental restaurant fare.

Beautiful diversity is found in many aspects of the archipelago. From the Denarau shore, you can spot a few of the Mamanucas, a scenic cluster of 20 volcanic, limestone or coralsand islands of varying sizes and shapes with incredible beaches and offshore reefs. Small, sandy isles support coconut palms, others have grasslands and dry forest. Most have a Fijian village or resort community offering a variety of activities, from windsurfing and kayaking to deepsea diving. Underwater, the sheer variety of life around the reefs is a major attraction. Divers and snorkelers commune with millions of fish, turtles, giant clams and soft corals with shapes like mushrooms, fingers and honeycombs.

There are numerous ways to access the islands—ferries, seaplanes, cruises, even helicopters operate out of Nadi. If

sailing is your passion, drive north from the resort past cane fields fronting the Sabeto Mountains to the lively seaport sugar town of Laukota, where you can board a 140-foot-long, three-masted schooner bound for Tai Island. You'll enjoy a picnic lunch and snorkel in the coral reef waters, and can link up with cruises to other isles.



Nadi, with its international airport, great bus system, numerous taxis and tour operators, is the tourism hub of western Viti Levu and the third-largest community on the island. It's a hot, relatively dry town of 20,000 people strung along the Queen's Highway, the main route around the western perimeter of the island. Nadi may not have much in the way of aboriginal or colonial charm, but it's a great place to shop for traditional crafts, arrange boating and snorkeling excursions, and join trips to the spectacular mountains and villages of the Nausori Highlands. Its large Indian population also makes Nadi a great place to sample Fiji Indian food, while supermarkets supplement the traditional open-air market for

home-cooked meals at your WorldMark resort.

Venture into Nadi's market and shops to buy fine folk crafts made by methods that date back many centuries. Look for wall hangings, handbags and placemats of tapa or masi, an inexpensive, felt-soft cloth made from pounded and sun-dried paper mulberry bark and stained with red clay and black burned candlenuts in rhythmic geometric designs. Also seek out the hand-molded clay-and-sand pottery that is still made in a few villages by methods thousands of years old: pots are heated over an open fire and varnished with tree gum to bring out the color and improve the pot's ability to hold water. The cooking vessels are fragile, but sturdier items like animal

figurines are made for visitors.

Fijian woodcarving is in a bit of decline since there isn't much call for war clubs or cannibal forks these days, but those items—as well as carved bowls-are still made. You'll find drinking bowls in the section of the market where yaqona is sold. This pepper plant root is used for making Fiji's mildly sedative national drink, kava, which seems to be a part of any and all festivities.

A fun yet practical purchase would be a sulu, a lightweight wraparound sarong worn by both men and women that can double as a towel or dressing gown. Wear it over shorts or beachwear whenever the occasion calls for modesty, such as during village visits. You'll feel very Fijian.

FIJI FACTS

CLIMATE

Temperatures are pleasant year-round on the coast, with daytime highs in the 80s and evenings in the 70s. June to October is the dry season; December to April is the rainy season, though sunshine often follows rain, and is not usually a nuisance. Hurricane season is November to April.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

To enter Fiji, you will need a ticket for your departure and a passport valid for at least three months beyond your intended stay. Visas are not necessary for stays up to four months.

CLOTHING

In Fiji, it's considered offensive to show too much skin. Bathing suits should only be worn around the pool—not into town. Men should always wear a shirt,

and women's dresses or shorts should adequately cover their legs while seated.

TRANSPORTATION

Trendwest Travel can book your airfare to Fiji. Airtime from Los Angeles is 10 hours, 40 minutes. Taxis will be lined up outside the Nadi International Airport concourse. Be sure to settle on your fare before setting out. (To WorldMark Denarau Island, \$8 USD is a fair charge.)

In Fiji, there are two types of buses: express (with limited stops) and local "stage" (with unlimited stops).

Though renting a car is not recommended, valid drivers licenses are honored. Driving is on the left side of the road.

ELECTRICITY

Electrical current in Fiji is 240 volts, 50 cycles. Be sure to bring converters and adapters for personal appliances. (World-Mark Denarau Island includes blow dryers in each bathroom.)

TIME ZONE

Fiji is 12 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time from March to October. It's 13 hours ahead November to February, when daylight savings time is in effect. In other words, Fiji is currently 20 hours ahead of the West Coast.

TIPPING

American-style tipping is discouraged.

MONEY MATTERS

The currency is the Fiji dollar. The current exchange rate is about \$1 USD to \$2 FJD.

The 24-hour ANZ Bank branch at Nadi International Airport charges a fee for each transaction. Other banks and other ANZ branches in Fiji do not.

Credit cards are accepted at most resorts, travel and tour companies, dutyfree shops and some restaurants, but you will want to have cash on hand when exploring rural areas. Remember that you'll need to pay an airport departure tax of \$20 FJD per person in Fiji currency.


GETTING INTO THE COUNTRY

You have two basic options for seeing the villages of Fiji: Join a formal tour, or pass through on roads or trails. (Never walk into a Fijian village uninvited—it's rude.) Tours can give you an intimate look at village life, with dinners cooked in a lovo pit oven, river swimming, waterfall visits, songfests over the kava bowl and maybe even nuanced meke story dances, in which the village chief takes part. They often involve overnight stays and may be more expensive than independent travel.

You can rent a car in Fiji for your own explorations, but you'll have to watch out for roaming livestock, unwary pedestrians and speeding sugar trains while negotiating speed bumps and remembering to drive on the left side of the road, so it's really not recommended. Public transportation—buses, ferries, airplanes and taxis—is widely available, reasonably priced, entertaining and a great way to

mingle with the people. It's especially cheap and engaging to join Indian and Fijian locals aboard the ancient, noisy, smoke-belching buses that serve all parts of Viti Levu. Help your fellow passengers roll tarps over the open-air windows if it rains. Buses can be caught at numerous roadside stands, and you can even flag them down in the country. Several companies also offer express, airconditioned bus service to the major





cities—less interesting, perhaps, but also more comfortable. Minibus and return taxi service also are available around Nadi.

THE CORAL COAST

A delightful self-directed excursion is a day-long bus tour of the Coral Coast, 50 miles of barrier reef beaches and pristine waters on the sheltered southern side of Viti Levu. Large stretches of uninhabited rain forest surround resorts and fishing villages scattered along beaches, bays and rocky outcroppings that rise steeply into the volcanic mountains. Head out of Nadi past the great multicolored pile of Sri Siva Subramaniya Swami Temple on the left, then roll through sugar cane fields and pine plantations. A few miles south of Nadi, some buses will take an 18-mile detour to Momi Bay through farmland, cane fields and pine plantations, past small temples and mosques.

About 30 miles southeast of your WorldMark resort, you'll catch a magnificent hilltop view of the Fijian Resort, one of the islands' original vacation retreats, surrounded by sandy beaches and colorful coral reefs on a 109-acre island in a private bay. On the highway near the resort, the Coral Coast Railway offers scenic trips to the beach on an old sugar train through villages, plantations and undeveloped land to Natadola—the best beach on the island, which most tourists never see. Body surf the big waves if you're a strong swimmer, hunt for shells in the gorgeous white sand, snorkel in the tide pools and buy a green coconut for a refreshing drink. At the Ka Levu Centre, you can see a reconstructed pre-European Fijian village.

Another nine miles along Queen's Road is Sigatoka, a plain little farming town with a gorgeous mosque, an abundant municipal market, and access to some of Fiji's most picturesque landscapes and traditional villages. Hop on an openair bus for a four-hour trip to Keiyasi and back through the spectacular volcanic hills of the Sigatoka Valley. You'll wind past Fijian villages, Indian settlements, grassy scrub hillsides, and a colorful patchwork of small farms growing peanuts, corn, taro root, peppers and passion fruit. Handmade bamboo rafts and small boats filled with cabbages, corn, tomatoes and tobacco float down the muddy Sigatoka River to market. At the villages of Nakabuta or Lawaii, hop off the bus and ask about the local pottery. You'll be taken to a bure showing the smooth, low-fired cooking pots traditional in the lower Sigatoka Valley.

South of town, Sigatoka Sand Dunes National Park is one of Fiji's most exquisite sights. Walk along three miles of undulating hillocks of soft, powdery graybrown sand, grass and vines for vistas of green mountains and blue ocean. Archaeological digs and the wind continue to reveal skeletons and pottery artifacts dating back 2,000 years. (Don't remove any bones or shards—it's illegal.)

Surfing and windsurfing along this stretch of coastline can be excellent, but the seas are dangerous for swimmers.

IT'S THE PEOPLE

The joy of vacationing in Fiji involves mingling with its gentle people as much as sightseeing, relaxing or playing in the water. Getting to know the locals is easy to do because our shared British colonial history gives us a common language that reaches across our civilizations, helping us appreciate each other more fully. The islands' landscapes, produce and lifestyles are wonderfully exotic, but the people make it seem like home. Vinaka, Fiji!

NADI NOTABLES

DINING

Continental Cakes & Pizza (Main Street, opposite Mobil Station) has delicious coffee, rolls and cakes, and three sizes of pizza. At Cardo's Steakhouse & Bar (Port Denarau Marina), dine on succulent char grilled steaks and fish—with a view. Make reservations at Chefs The Restaurant (Sangayam Road) for a romantic, candlelit dinner. Extremely spicy Indo-Fijian fare can be found at Mid-Town Curry Restaurant (Clay Street). South Indian dishes are the specialty of Hot Snax Shop (Naviti Street) in nearby Lautoka.

SHOPPING


Just north of your resort, you can browse the upscale boutiques at the Sheraton Fiji Resort. Sogo Fiji (Queen's Road) has tropical clothing and beachwear. Nad's Handicrafts (north end of town) sells nice pottery. Jack's Handicrafts (off Main Street, opposite Morris Hedstrom) offers a wide selection of reasonably priced handcrafts, clothing, jewelry and paintings by local artists. Fine woven baskets can be bought directly from the women who make them at the Nadi Handicraft Market (south end of town).

EXPLORATION

The elaborate Sri Siva Subramaniya Temple (south end of town) was built by craftspeople flown in from India, and is the largest Hindu shrine in the South Pacific. It's open daily, with free admission. Acres of orchids and other flowering plants can be viewed Monday through Saturday at The Garden of the Sleeping Giant (Wailoko Road off Queen's Road, between Nadi and Lautoka). A guided tour and fruit drink is included in the admission fee (\$9.90 FID for adults; \$4.90 FJD for children). Several tour operators will take you from Nadi along bumpy roads into the spectacular Nausori Highlands. During your journey, you'll pass sugarcane fields, farmhouses and mosques, through lovely rolling hills into deeply clefted mountains overlooking the sea. It is also possible to visit or, for a truly unique experience, spend the night at Navala, one of the last fully thatched villages on Viti Levu. Inquire at WorldMark Denarau Island for more information about such excursions.

Let the Good Times Roll

Footloose in New Orleans

- There is a mind-boggling number of Web sites catering to all things gastronomical. DineSite.com offers detailed restaurant information and visitor reviews. Fodors.com also has restaurant listings sortable by name, price, location, cuisine and score.
- At subscription-based Zagat.com, you can search on a number of criteria, such as

cuisine, popularity, cost, special features (like "Young Children" or "Romantic Spots") and quality of food, decor and service.

• More comprehensive than any of the above sites, Dine.com proclaims itself the largest online restaurant review site, with over 150,000 restaurants and 120,000 reviews.

A Tall Order

- It isn't enough to end up at a good restaurant; you must also order well. Be sure to ask the waiter if he has any personal recommendations. Choosing a regional specialty, such as lobster while in Rosarito Beach, is always a wise idea.
- If you have a young child in your family, I suggest boycotting the children's menu and asking for an extra plate, instead. By sharing your meal with your toddler, you not only save money, but the quality of her food will be better and your child can try new things.
- For those with distinct dietary needs (you're on a low-cholesterol diet, for example), eating out can be difficult or simply monotonous. Don't be afraid to order "off" the menu if you don't see anything appropriate or appetizing listed. For instance, ask for an item to be specially prepared (no salt) or see if the chef can put together an entrée consisting of side dishes (say, garlic mashed potatoes and grilled vegetables).
