Things to See and Do in and Around Tucson

When you visit Tucson, you won't be at a loss for things to do. To see one of the true symbols of the Southwest—the giant saguaro cactus—visit **Saguaro National Park West**. The Sonoran Desert is the only place where these majestic cacti grow. **Tohono Chul Park** is a 48-acre oasis filled with nature trails, gardens, palo verde trees and a recirculating stream. At the peaceful **Tucson Botanical Gardens**, you can learn about the many plants that thrive in southern Arizona.

The spectacular **Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum** features more than 300 species of animals and 1,300 kinds of plants. Here you might catch sight of the elusive Gila Monster, along with cougars, otters, bighorn sheep and plenty of creepy-crawlies. It also has a bird sanctuary, nature trails, a botanical garden, and a gem and mineral museum.

Southeastern Arizona is ranked one of the top five areas for **birdwatching** in the U.S., thanks to the climate and diversity of the terrain. Popular spots for birdwatching include **Madera and Ramsey canyons**.

Astronomers will be in heaven here. **Kitt Peak National Observatory** has the

world's three largest solar telescopes and offers tours of the facility, fascinating exhibits on astronomy and stargazing programs at night. For another stellar view, take a tour of the **Fred Lawrence Whipple Observatory**, one hour from Tucson.

An interesting attraction is **Biosphere 2**, where eight scientists once lived inside a three-acre, glass-enclosed, self-sustaining model of Earth. Now more of a historical attraction than a habitat, it's open daily for tours.

The luminescent **Mission San Xavier del Bac** just south of Tucson was constructed in the late 1700s. The "White Dove of the Desert" is one of the finest examples of Spanish mission architecture to be found.

Dubbed a "mini-mecca for the arts" by *The Wall Street Journal*, downtown Tucson boasts its own **symphony, ballet, opera and theater** companies, along with more than 215 other arts groups and organizations. Art lovers will want to check out **DeGrazia's Gallery in the Sun**, the former home and workshop of the renowned Tucson artist. The **Tucson Museum of Art** features pre-Columbian artifacts, Spanish colonial art and

furniture, and a wing devoted entirely to Western painting and sculpture. The **Center for Creative Photography** at the University of Arizona boasts the foremost collection of Ansel Adams in the country.

Forty minutes from downtown, the **Pima Air and Space Museum** is the biggest privately-funded air museum in the world with more than 200 vintage and modern aircraft.

After a day of hitting the museums, take to the greens. More than 35 courses are in the vicinity, with one of the best—**The Golf Club at Vistoso**—right around the corner.

For kids (or kids-at-heart) who've always dreamed of being cowboys, **Old Tucson**—part movie set, part Western theme park—is a must-see. If you want to visit the real thing, gallop on over to **Tombstone**, "The Town Too Tough To Die."

For Mexican treasures, crossing the border is simple. The drive to **Nogales** is 100 miles, and you can park in Arizona and cross the border by foot.

Driving Directions

From Tucson Airport


- Exit the airport onto Tucson Blvd, which turns into Benson Hwy.
- Turn right onto Kino Blvd North, then right onto I-10 West (toward Phoenix.)
- Travel on I-10 for approx. 20 miles and take Exit 240 (Tangerine Rd.)
- Turn right onto Tangerine and drive 12 miles east.
- Turn left on Rancho Vistoso Blvd and drive 2.2 miles.
- Turn left onto Vistoso Highlands Dr.
- Make an immediate left (100 feet) onto Hidden Springs Dr. Look for WorldMark sign 1 1/2 blocks on the right.

From Phoenix, AZ

- Take I-10 East approx. 100 miles to Exit 240 (Tangerine Rd).
- Turn left onto Tangerine and drive 12 miles east.
- Follow the **bold** directions to the left.

From Downtown Tucson, AZ

- Take Oracle Rd (Highway 77) north toward Oro Valley.
- Turn left (west) on First Ave.
- First Ave becomes Rancho Vistoso Blvd. Drive 2.2 miles ahead.
- Turn left on Vistoso Highlands Dr.
- Make an immediate left (100 feet) onto Hidden Springs Dr. The entrance to the resort is on the right.



**Note: We strongly advise using your vehicle's odometer to track mileage. City ordinances have ordained low-level lighting and small street signs, which make it difficult to navigate at night.*
